



Attended the installation of newest member Reverend Eric Jackson as pastor of his church. Club President, Meg Ager took part in the ceremony on behalf of the Lions. PCC Don and Meg Ager attended Kentucky Pin Swap. Also attended the USA/Canada Lions Leadership Forum in Grand Rapids along with Associate Members ID Robert and Michelle Libin. He requested the service so he could see movies locally, rather than drive to one of the other three in the state. 



Did you know that OCTOBER is WHITE CANE and DOG GUIDE USERS AWARENESS MONTH in NEW HAMPSHIRE?

As eight different agencies and organizations of and for the blind and vision impaired in the State, they have come together to raise awareness of white cane and dog guide users. Reaching out to educators, youth group leaders and other similar groups to help in promoting white cane and dog guide users' awareness. Two of their projects are oriented toward education, with a focus on elementary and middle school students. The hope is to incorporate something related to this topic during the month of October.

Included were educational activity sheets at two different complexity levels relating to white cane and dog guide users, as well as a poster/essay contest with prizes (due October 31st). Art and its expression is for all students and are encouraging entries from all learners.

If you need creative ideas about how to include a student who may have challenges taking part in these activities, please seek the assistance of an available professional for the student, such as an occupational therapist, special education teacher or a teacher of the visually impaired.

October 15 Is White Cane Safety Day. This is an International, National and State observance. It's a day to raise awareness about the significance and purpose of the white cane. Some clubs hold events around this time or publicize existing events. How will your club celebrate?

The first documented use of the white cane as an identification aid for a blind person was in England in 1920. After the First World War, there were more people who were blinded when they were young and active. The white cane helped them get about more safely. In 1944, Dr Richard Hoover developed the long white cane which turned an identification cane into a mobility cane. Once again, this was necessary because a great number of young, active individuals did not want to sit at home simply because they were blinded in the war.

The first use of the white cane in the United States was in Peoria, Illinois in 1931 at Lions Club initiative. Lions Clubs International liked the idea and made it their own. The first White Cane Safety Day was promulgated in 1964 by President Lyndon B. Johnson. It has been renewed every year since.

Why focus on the white cane in an article for the DogSight Project? Before an individual can qualify for a guide dog, he or she must first prove proficiency with a white cane and to know how to travel independently. A dog doesn't know how to get from A to B; the dog ensures that the trip occurs safely. A guide dog can't tell that the light has changed; it's up to the handler to say "let's go," and the dog to determine if the crossing is safe to make.

In 1921, James Biggs became blind after an accident. There was a lot of traffic around his home, so he painted his walking stick white to be more visible. In 1931, Guilly d'Herbemont launched a national "white stick movement" in France. The white cane has become a way for the blind or visually impaired to show their special travel needs.

When You Meet a Dog Guide

Dog guides have a very important job to do!

You can help them in the following ways:

- ⇒ **DO NOT** let your pet near a dog guide.
- ⇒ **DO** let a person who is blind know that you are nearby.
- ⇒ **DO NOT** call the dog's name, make eye contact, feed or talk to the dog.
- ⇒ **DO NOT** pet a dog guide when he is wearing the harness.
- ⇒ If the dog is resting without their harness, ask the owner before you pet the dog.
- ⇒ **Thank you!** (Source: Guide Dog Foundation)

Dog guides help their owners travel from place to place, cross streets safely, get on and off different forms of transportation, and avoid obstacles in their path.

However, the dog does not know where to go like a GPS. The owner must know how to direct his or her dog where to go.


