








N. ALAN LUNDGREN INTERNATIONAL DIRECTOR



Musing from SVDG Fred Plett

I have just come back from the Lions International Advanced Lions Leadership Institute "ALLI" in Houston, where Jerry Vaccaro, Second VDG for District 44H, and I spent three packed-full days with Lions from across the USA and Canada, very positive people, and the positive energy has given me new wings under my feet. I hope you all have a chance to do something similar. It was a lot like USA-Canada Forum but smaller, and more intimate. Lion Sue Lindberg was also in Houston attending a different Lions Forum, the Lions International Faculty Development Institute. I have come back to NH with a new network of friends. It is amazing how similar the problems are anywhere on this continent. Lions are Lions, we may have different projects, different multiple council structures, and different languages, but similar issues and concerns, so we can learn from each other how to constructively handle issues when they arise.

Clubs with a positive meeting dynamic, people working together for a common goal, and having fun while doing it, will naturally grow in size and prestige. I heard countless recitations of these experiences at ALLI. I also heard about clubs with a negative dynamic, back-biting, criticism, anger and personality conflicts, and these clubs will naturally shrink, driving members away and failing to recruit. Unless these clubs change their ways, they are doomed to disappear. What kind of club is your club? Do people want to come and be part of success, or do they want to stay away? If you have energy that sometimes isn't positive, a little introspection and perhaps seminars in constructive conflict resolution could help. There is nothing wrong with healthy conflict, because diversity of opinions might lead to stronger, more well thought out projects and actions, but there is something wrong when it leads to personal attacks, negativity, and other destructive behavior. We, in District leadership, want to encourage the former, and discourage the latter. With my new-found training, and that which the rest of leadership has already had access to, perhaps we can help reset negative tones into positive, constructive, behaviors.





For the most part, photos have been taken of each poster submitted by your club. There are still some photos being taken for participants of the contest. Hopefully, they will be completed in the next week or so.





LCIF - 52 Million in Grants Distributed Last Year

While many of us include those in need in our thoughts around Christmas time, how many of our Clubs think of our most incredible International Foundation and all the great things it does around the world?

LCIF has earned it's FOURTH consecutive <u>4-star rating with Charity Navigator</u> for its effective fiscal management and its commitment to accountability and transparency. Only eight percent of the charities evaluated earned a fourth consecutive 4-star rating.

This exceptional distinction means that LCIF outperforms most other charitable organizations in the United States. LCIF donors can be confident that their donations are being used in support of the programs for which they are intended. Approximately 1/3 of the Clubs in District 44N have made a commitment for this fiscal year. Most of these donations are for the purchase of the \$2000 individual pins.

We became involved when Ruth Holmes two years ago spoke to our club asking us to assist her grandson Keine Marland in his mission to help those with diabetes in the north country. For four years now, Ruth and Keine have been fundraising by holding an annual 5K walk/run and doing various raffles. During the past two years the Littleton Lions Club has formed a committee with alliances with local pharmacies, the hospital and medical professionals to provide vouchers for those in need to receive financial assistance for medications and testing supplies. We did two evenings of "Dining for a Cause" in two local restaurants, "99" and Topic of the Town, which donated 15% of their evenings proceeds. 
