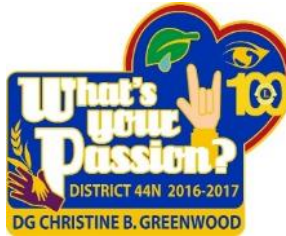

Hard to imagine half of the Lion year has been completed – the leadership team recognizes how hard the clubs in the District are working to help their communities –

we, **THANK each of YOU!** With each visit, we learn more and more of how much passion each club has for community with the unique projects and fundraisers specific to their community.

As we all know, this year is truly a special year, celebrating the Centennial of Lions. I know many clubs have been reporting, actually to be specific as of January:

- 244 activities have been recorded involving over 4,123 hours, estimated to have assisted 27,186 people in District 44N
- 31 (76%) have completed at least ONE activity of the four campaigns
- 25 (61% have completed at least TWO
- 12 (29%) have completed ALL FOUR

Many clubs are working on their Centennial Community Legacy projects – remember, these are visible gifts that help clubs connect with their communities and create lasting Lion legacies in your community. I feel this quote works so well for LIONS. We are successful because we love what we do for people.

As you probably know by now, we are in the middle of the 100<sup>th</sup> year of Lionism. The world is a completely different place than it was 100 years ago. 100 yes ago, there wasn't any internet or cell phones or social media. In 1917, computers were still 25 years off and they were enormous machines with the very first on weighing almost 50 tons and full of 18,000 vacuum tubes.

There was one thing that Lions did 100 years ago that Lions still do today. They asked other people to join them. It has been a large part of the success on the Lions Movement. And for Lionism to continue on this path, we need to continue to Just Ask 1.

After we ask them, we need to discern if the new Lion has any leadership initiative. One of the ways to spot leadership initiative is to look for the “volunteer gene”. **HEARING SCREENING IS BACK !!**

Lion Rosalie Smith of Contoocook ([theNurseNice@hotmail.com](mailto:theNurseNice@hotmail.com) 603-848-3402) is the new Hearing Coordinator for Northern MD44 (Zones 5-8 in 44N and of 44H).

Betty Gay ([jbgay@comcast.net](mailto:jbgay@comcast.net) 603-818-1614) of Hudson Lions is the new Hearing Screening Coordinator for Southern MD44 (Zones 1-4).

NH Lions used to do a lot of hearing screening but it kind of got left in the dust with the excitement about vision screening with the wonderful SPOT screeners. Rosalie and I have stepped up to revitalize the project by letting Lions try out the "Pilot" screeners.

Invite us to your Zone and club meetings so you can hear the Pilot's simple phrases at varying decibels that ask little children to point to a picture, easier for them than pressing a button when hearing a tone. The little ones love doing the test. The kids get a Lion coloring page as a reward, which also serves to advertise our services to their families.

The Pilot consists of four things - an instrument panel, earphones, a colorful picture board, and pre-printed forms that you check off as the child identifies the pictures. All you do is put the freshly-wiped headphones on the child, set one of the four series of pictures on the board, select the right or left ear, and push the [Start] button. Another volunteer checks the recording form as the child identifies the pictures called for by the voice in the earphones. That's it. The forms are left behind with the responsible person because they are HIPAA-protected personal health information.

The reporting is super simple, too, just emails telling the name and phone number of who did the screening, where they did it and the contact person there, the date, the number and age range of children screened, and the number of children referred because they could not hear at 25 decibels or louder.

I hope you can fit us in as you schedule your next Zone or Club meeting. It only takes ten minutes to explain our goal to screen children as young as possible, and then time for everyone to try out the Pilots.

Rosie doesn't exactly answer that question, but makes sure I'm always safe.

Train travel is ideal for a guide dog. Car and plane spaces are rather cramped, but the accessibility accommodations on trains allow more room for a dog to stretch out and be comfortable. I had taken Rosie on a couple of local excursion trains so I knew she would be OK on a longer trip. The only thing she HATED was the whistle – but only when we were outside the train. I imagine it hurt her ears.

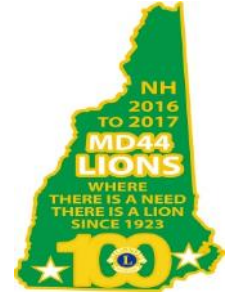
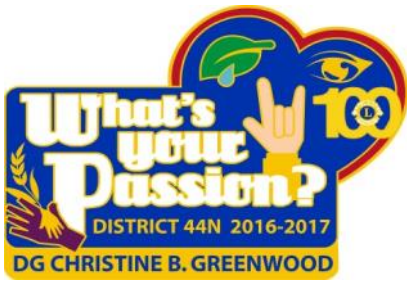

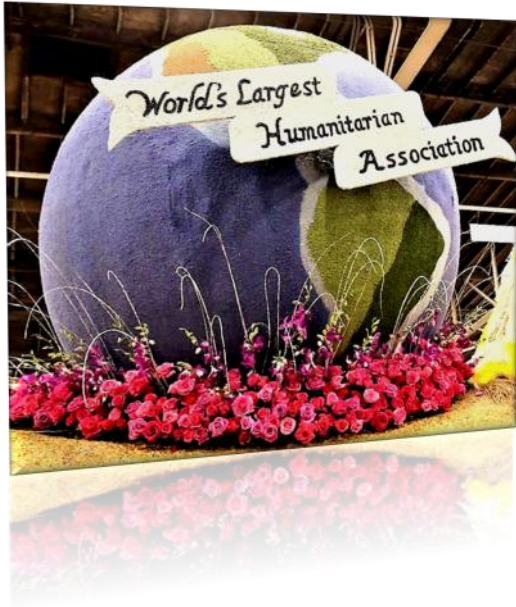

The theme of the 2017-18 Lions International Essay Contest is "The Future of Peace." Students who are visually impaired and who are ages 11, 12 or 13 on November 15, are eligible to participate.
