

Given her "body sensitivity," booties are out of the question. She alerts me to her opinion that the ground is too cold by walking on three legs frequently a different three in the same walk - or limping. When I use Mushers' Secret, no funny walking or limping. 

Health Services Board Stories to Warm Your Heart



There are some changes we wanted to let you know about. First, by the time you read this, HSB may have a new name. We may be called Health Services of NH or HSNH. Next, if you have eyeglasses to recycle, you can bring them to cabinet meetings and/or conventions. The Eyeglass and Hearing Aid Coordinators are Jill Healey for 44N and Randy Thompkins for 44H. They make sure the glasses are recycled through Lions Club Recycling Centers.

If you would like to make a donation to help with shipping costs please send them to the Hampton Area Lions Club at PO Box 1088, Hampton NH 03843.

If you do take them to Lenscrafters, they destroy the glasses and sell the pieces for scrap. Proceeds are then given to their OneSight program.

Finally, with all the screenings that you all do, what happens after the screening? One of our members shared the follow up she received from the OKS Coordinator for the Hampton Area Lions Club:

"All seven of the concerns raised by Spot screening have been or are being addressed. Three have returned reports indicating no treatment required at this time, One will receive eyeglasses that are yet to arrive, One is followed at a Children's Hospital for long term congenital eye issues, One has an appointment with an eye doctor, expecting that an Insurance question will be resolved, One is between appointments but has seen the eye doctor and is undergoing evaluation."

It is nice to know that the screenings are finding issues that can be treated.
