usings from DG Fred Plett

I hope you had a wonderful Christmas or Hanukkah break. Happy New Year. As we approach and go into 2019, and make our resolutions, let us review our Lions lives. The Lions year is half over. It is a good time to review the goals we set at the beginning of the Lions year, in July, and to see how we are doing against those goals.

Are we doing the service projects that our communities value and that meet the passions of our membership? Do we have the membership to carry out those service projects? If not, do we have a plan in place to recruit new members, then to train, orient, activate and retain them?

We recently concluded the November Nirvana membership contest. Congratulations to the Chesterfield, Franklin and Merrimack Lions clubs, who grew by 3, 2 and 2 members respectfully from November 1st to December 15th. Each net new member warranted a slip of paper in a basket for the November Nirvana prize. A third party drew the slip, and the Chesterfield Lions were the winners of the November Nirvana contest. CT David Pierce just sent to LCI a \$100 check in the Chesterfield Lions club name, for the Chesterfield Lions to use at the LCI store in any way they choose.

On February 9th or 16th, in the Concord area (details still being worked out as of this writing), there will be a training course for Guiding Lions, postponed from October. Look elsewhere in the Roar for details, or if not done by publication, then a supplemental e-mail blast will be sent. We need good Lions certified as guiding lions, to be assigned to clubs who temporarily could use some help.

District 44N just submitted a \$10,000 grant request to LCIF for half the monies need for our Camp Allen District project, to replace a decrepit John Deere Gator Utility vehicle and two decrepit golf carts, used constantly by the camp to place campers and luggage from and to vehicles and their campsite, and to transport staff and campers during the sessions. It takes 90+ days for LCIF to evaluate a grant. We hope to get a positive response on the grant request after the April LCI Board of Directors meeting.

Thanks to the Hopkinton Lions, we have raised \$1,500 towards the goal of \$10,000 needed from clubs for our half of this District Project. As you review your finances for the second half of the year, please keep this District Project in mind.

Congratulations to the Pinardville Lions club for having the winning Peace Poster statewide. The winner and runner up will be at Mid-Winter convention. I look forward to seeing many of you at the Mid-Winter convention at the Doubletree in Nashua January 26-28th.

American Gold Star Mothers is a private organization of American mothers who lost sons or daughters in service of the United States Armed Forces. It was originally formed in 1928 for mothers of those lost in World War I.

Its name came from the custom of families of servicemen hanging a banner called a service flag in the windows of their homes. The service flag had a star for each family member in the Armed Forces.

Armed Services veterans and those on active duty are represented by a blue star, those wounded in action are represented by a red star, and those who have lost their lives in combat are represented by a gold star.

Robert S. Littlefield, PH.D Past International Director LCIF Trustee for Constitutional Area 1

Dr. Robert S. Littlefield from Oviedo, Florida, USA, was elected to serve a two-year term as a director of Lions Clubs International at the associations 97th International Convention held in Toronto, Canada, July 4 through 8, 2014. Following his term on the LCI Board, he was appointed to a three-year term (2016-2019) as a Trustee on the LCIF Board of Directors representing Constitutional Area I (largest constitutional area membership). He is Chairperson of the 2019 DGE School scheduled for Oak Brook, IL, and Milan, Italy.

Director Littlefield is Founding Director of the Nicholson School of Communication and Media at the University of Central Florida in Orlando.

A member of the Fargo (ND) Lions Club since 1984, and associate member of the Oviedo Winter Springs Lions Club (FL) since 2016, Littlefield has held many offices within the association, including district governor, LCIF district coordinator, GLT district coordinator, council chair, multiple district convention chair, multiple district public relations chair, and is a certified guiding Lion. He served as president of the North Dakota Past District Governors' Association and was inducted into the ND Lions Hall of Fame in 2017.

In recognition of his service to the association, he has received numerous awards, including the District Governor Excellence Award, nine Presidential Certificates of Appreciation, an International Leadership Award, the Senior Builder Key Award, and five International President's Medals. He is Progressive Melvin Jones Fellow and a Second Century Ambassador.

In addition to his Lions activities, Director Littlefield is active in numerous professional and community organizations, including the National Communication Association, the American Forensic Association, the National Speech and Debate Educators Association, and the Pi Kappa Delta National Forensic Honorary.

Director Littlefield and his wife, Lion Kathy, have two children and two grandchildren.

The annual Multiple District 44 State Convention Meeting will be held on January 26, 2019, at the Double Tree by Hilton Hotel in Nashua, NH. At this meeting the following resolution that will change our current Constitution & By-Laws will be presented to the Delegates for their consideration:

Resolution #1:

Whereas the New Hampshire Lions, Multiple District 44, are in convention assembled, and whereas, the Multiple District 44 Constitution and By-Laws have been updated to include information regarding the positions of the Global Service Team Leader (GST), Global Membership Team Leader (GMT, Global Leadership Team Leader (GLT), and Lions Clubs International Foundation Coordinator (LCIF) for the Multiple District; Conflict of Interest Policy; and Changes to the Health Services of New Hampshire Committee, as outlined to the Clubs in the Multiple District 44 Constitution and By-Laws draft sent to Clubs in December; be it hereby resolved that the changes to the Multiple District 44 Constitution and By-Laws be accepted as printed. This resolution has been recommended for adoption by Multiple District 44 Council and Health Services of NH Committee. Since both Constitution and By-Law articles are being voted upon, this will require a 2/3 vote of those present and voting for these changes to pass.

This next resolution will be voted upon at the Sight & Hearing Foundation, Inc. meeting in the afternoon on January 26th at the Convention.

Resolution #1:

Whereas the New Hampshire Lions, Multiple District 44, are in convention assembled, and whereas, The Lions Sight & Hearing Foundation of New Hampshire, Inc., is holding its annual meeting; the following resolution to change the following By-Law Articles is presented to the membership for their consideration:

Change Article I, Section D, Section 2 to the following:

Vice President: The Vice-President shall exercise the powers and perform the functions that are from time to time assigned to him/her by the President. The Vice-President shall have the powers and shall exercise the duties of the President whenever the President, by reason of illness or other disability or absence, is unable to act, and at other times when specifically so directed by the Board of Directors. Vice President shall be Chairperson of the Projects Committee as referenced in Article 4, Section C. The Vice President shall oversee all Committees including the projects committee.

Change Article IV, Section C to the following:

Projects Committee: A Project Committee may be appointed which shall screen service projects and give direction with reference to recommending service projects for the Foundation to undertake. The liaison between patient and foundation shall be a Lions Club in New Hampshire or Director of this Board. The Vice-President shall be Chairperson and may appoint a committee of two (2) members from the Board of Directors. The Project Chair will be appointed and must be a member of the Board of Directors. The Project Chair may appoint a committee of up to 2 people. Those appointed need not be directors of the Foundation.

This resolution has been approved by the Sight & Hearing Foundation and will require a majority of those present and voting to have these changes pass.

Please review these resolutions carefully with your club members, so that those attending as delegates of your club will know the effect of the resolution change, and the club's decision on the resolution, in order that they may vote in the best interest of your club.






