

If each of us wrote a card, we will have thousands for our Troops. The NH Department of Education, for example, is reaching out to every school in the State, challenging each student to write a card! Plus having the full support of our Governor, Senators and Congresswomen surely helps.



I kicked off this year's Challenge in July to get started early. I have planned a "Holidays in September/October" Challenge in order to collect the cards and box them up to be sent in time for the Holidays. Deadline is October 30, 2018. Free cards/Drop stations: Hollis Pharmacy, Fulchino Vineyard (Hollis), Martha's Exchange (Nashua), Seedlings Café, Hairtharium (Both in Merrimack) and Sal's Pizza (Storrs Street in Concord).



Guidelines are simple: Address cards to, "Dear Warrior". Include a written (drawings are great too!) Holiday message that is serious or fun or both! The Troops love newsy notes. Sign your first name ONLY and City/State where you live. Handmade cards are fantastic too! Envelopes are great but not necessary. Size limit is no larger than an 8x11 paper folded in half.



I have formed a nonprofit corporation, "Holiday Cards 4 Our Military-NH Challenge", which will allow for tax- exempt donations All donations will be graciously accepted and truly appreciated. 



Perhaps what Manchester Lions is best known for is its partnership in 1931 with the Boston Kiwanis in founding a retreat for young girls who were blind. By the mid 60's, the mission was changed to include individuals of all ages with developmental and physical challenges and is known as Camp Allen. Today more than 450 different campers attend one or two and even multiple weeks of fun in the great outdoors. It is a typical camp with typical camping activities. In 1943, each member was given \$1 for re-investment and they raised \$500 for the Blind Camp fund and auctioned box lunches at picnic to benefit the fund. History reflects that in the twenties as well as today, the club focused on meeting the needs of the community. Projects in the twenty's included funding expenses at Camp Foster for underprivileged boys, grading an athletic field, sponsored a US Marine Band Concert, presented a radio to the Girls Home, and held an auction to raise funds to finance college education of two high school students.

Throughout the years, the Club has been active in community events including Salvation Army's Kettle Drive, St. Patrick's Day Parade, support of veterans including hosting Christmas Party at the VA Hospital, financial supporter of Manchester Central Little League, Haunted House Fundraisers, and Riverfest. A Manchester Lions brick can be found in the park in front of the Radisson Hotel to support of the Gold Star Mothers. A second brick promoting Manchester Lions can be found at the Manchester Animal Shelter. Its members have also been supportive of assisting neighboring Lions Club's projects including manpower assistance for Bedford Lions Gift Wrapping, Goffstown Lions Popcorn Machine, Hooksett Lions Train Show, Weare's Santa and Easter Fundraisers, and joint zone activities including tree planting

The community continues to rely on the Manchester Lions for assisting the poor with eye screening and vision wear and/or hearing aids, and eye glass recycling. In 2017-2018, over ten hearing cases were submitted to NH Sight and Hearing Foundation.

Most recent recognition includes in 2008 as "District 44N Small Club of the Year, and in 2013 as "District 44N Large Club of the Year.

As we commence our 95th year, focus areas include the projects of the district and International with a focus primarily on youth: the Salvation Army's Kids Café (hunger and social skills). Manchester School Districts' Kids Closet (warmth), OKS Eye Screening, ongoing community involvement to respond to unmet needs, and membership growth. Fundraisers planned include Breakfast with Santa, Spaghetti Dinner, Annual Concert as well as restaurant fundraisers.

In it's ninety-five years, the Manchester Lions have sponsored thirteen Lions clubs: (Nashua, Derry, Exeter, Lebanon, Suncook, Hillsboro, Durham, Concord, Wilton, Goffstown, Candia, Hooksett, and Bedford).

There have been several past District Governors and one International Director (Philip Peters, 1965-1967) and innumerable District and Multiple District Officers have called Manchester Lions home. The Club has recognized seven members with a Granite State Fellow. four members with a Melvin Jones.



NASHUA LIONS CLUB

With the ink barely dry on their charter, the Manchester Lions Club came to Nashua and with assistance from Lions Clubs International met with a prominent group of local business leaders and in September of 1923, the Nashua Lions club was chartered and now New Hampshire had two Lions clubs and Lionism was born.

In the beginning, Nashua Lions focused on meeting local needs. They begun meeting at the YMCA on Temple Street, later moving to Howard Johnson's, the Holiday Inn, back to HoJo's, the Ground Round and finally to the Crowne Plaza (now the Doubletree Hotel).

Many of the charter members had deep ties to the community. In fact, over the years, three former Mayors Lester Burnham, Mario Vagge, and Jim Donchess, three Fire Chiefs, Albert Tanguay, Roger Hatfield and current Chief Brian Rhodes, and former Chief of Police Paul J. Tracey were among their members. Brothers Peter and Achilles Scontsas both served the club as president, while PDG Phil Flynn served five times as president.

The first major project undertaken by the club was in 1954 with construction of the Friendship Club. This was a place for those with physical impediments to meet and socialize when being different weren't as acceptable as it is today. Two current members, Al Savage and Jimmy Stellos both worked on the project.

Seventy-two years ago, charter member C. Wally Lawrence got the club behind an annual dinner for the Nashua High boys' basketball team—win or lose—every year. While the presentation has changed over the years, the club continues with the team recognition, now at both Nashua North and South. On the 50th celebration, the club named an award after Lawrence recognizing his contributions to the event.

Past District Governor Joe Bielawski was the driving force for Nashua's involvement with Lions Camp Pride. In recognition of that, the club built a bunkhouse at camp and it was named in his honor. PDG Joe was an early supporter of Lions Twin State Soccer.

In the early 90's Nashua took on their second building project, this time is a home addition for a family with a severely handicapped child. "Melanie's Room" was started during King Lion Phil Flynn's term and completed by King Lion Rich Nadeau, who served as contractor for the project. The efforts on this earned Nashua Large Club of the Year in 44H from DG Mike Lambert.

Working closely with Nashua School Nurses, the club has purchase eye testing machines for all public schools twice. Thanks to club members at Nashua Eye Associates, any child in school found to need an exam or glasses is handled by them when we're notified by the nurse.

For several years, the club sponsored the Miss Nashua Scholarship program, a stepping stone for the Miss New Hampshire and Miss America programs. The first Miss Nashua was Lion Holly (LaTulippe) Poitras, daughter of PCC's Roger and Deedee LaTulippe.

As the membership grew, a number of current former teachers joined and in 2001 the club voted to begin a Teacher of the Year award. The annual event recognizes any public or private school educator in Nashua nominated by the community.

When International President Eberhard Wirfs asked clubs to come up with a "Lion-In-Sight" program, the club in collaboration with the City of Nashua started the Holman Stadium Sports Legends Hall of Fame. Every year at the July 4th celebration, the men and women who contributed to the history of Holman are inducted prior to the firework display.

The club has also assumed the Police Office and Fire Fighter of the Year programs from the former Nashua Exchange Club when they disbanded. Over the years, Nashua sponsored six lions clubs; Milford, Derry, Hudson, Peterborough, Hollis, Gate City, Nashua Everest Centennial. We've had five District Governors; Clifford H. Sloan, Joseph Bielawski, Ed Lecius, Philip E. Flynn and one International Director; Ed Lecius.
