• Every 2 minutes a child is diagnosed with cancer.

• There has been a 13% increase in incidence of childhood cancer over the last 20 years.

• The average age of cancer diagnosis in children is 6 years. 90% of childhood cancer deaths occur in low resource settings.

How can I help? Be on the Match Registry as a member who is committed to saving a life. New England District Governor Challenge: There are 13 District Governor's serving in the six New England States. This year they are conducting a combined challenge to see which District can encourage the highest number of donors in their own district. In upcoming issues of the ROAR I will be sharing with you news on this challenge, and how YOU can be a part of this life saving procedure. At the recent June meeting of the NELC (New England Lions Council), a young man, John Walker, spoke of his own journey with childhood cancer, and how a bone marrow transplant saved his life. Sad News with a Silver Lining

The work of a Fidelco Guide Dog requires the physical fitness of a trained athlete. They are expected to walk many miles a week and be engaged and alert at all times. A significant milestone then in Fidelco's Guide Dog training is the medical evaluations at the one year mark. All puppies in training are constantly evaluated for behavior and temperament, but their bodies must mature before they can be physically evaluated to see if they will have the stamina and good health required of a working dog.

Judge, the Fidelco puppy with Lions Theresa and Kerry Ford of the Winchester Centennial Lions club, was scheduled to begin his formal training in July at 13 months old. That is, until the results of his exams came back. He has been "released" from the Fidelco Guide Dog program because there are early signs that he could develop joint issues that would truncate his useful working life. It costs \$45,000 to provide the 15,000 hours of training required to make a Fidelco Guide Dog – only the very brightest and fittest dogs merit that investment. Judge, sadly, didn't make the cut because of potential future medical issues. [We think he is one of the very brightest, and certainly the cutest!]

The silver lining? Theresa and Kerry were given the opportunity to keep Judge as their pet. The Fords are looking forward to raising another Fidelco Guide Dog puppy, but will need to wait until Judge is older. In the meantime, they want to remind everyone that Fidelco is always looking for new puppy raisers. While they are disappointed that Judge will not continue with formal guide dog training, they appreciate everything that they learned throughout their puppy raising experiences with Fidelco.






