



Today, let's look at **Act/Intermediate** as listed by LCI:

- Help families get transportation to and from a treatment center
- Provide tutoring services for children with cancer
- Sponsor a child to attend a cancer camp or activity
- Through photography, document a child's journey as they undergo treatment
- Raise awareness through social media, or public screening of a film about childhood cancer
- Provide children's entertainment at a hospital or treatment center for children with cancer

Just this past week I learned of a 7-year old boy Mighty Max who has leukemia. Family and friends donate toys to a local hospital in Max's name. Contact your local hospital to see if there is some way in which you and your club can help.

Next month our DG challenge of New England District Governor's will be in full swing.

Check in to see what is happening in our district as we offer ways to be entered in the "Be The Match" Registry as a member who is committed to saving a child's life.

October is Eye Health Month

Think about it: what would you do if you lost 20%, 30% or more of your vision? Think about how that would change your life. Now think about children who are born with a slight deficiency in their sight. This slight deficit may not be detected for years. The child does not know that others see better than they do. The teacher/parents don't notice because the child seems to be doing everything fine. The child may be labeled as a slow learner because they miss the information they cannot see.

If your club has an eye screener, please get out there and approach the schools. They are very receptive to our screening process. Contact the nurse. It saves them lots of time and gives them more information to pass on to parents. Every district has "Child Find" evaluations that happen when children are about to go into kindergarten. Grades 1-12 get screened every year, with a couple of exceptions, and don't forget pre-schools and daycares if you have the time. All of these people will welcome you with open arms!

I have been doing this for four years now and I can screen 200+ children in one day. If you would like to know how I do this, or if you have any questions, feel free to contact me at workforpeace14@gmail.com.

Sue Rouillard Vision Awareness



This is a special article, as it is not about doctors, needles, or glucometers.

September was National Service Animal Month! This month you will meet a very special four-legged tool for Diabetes.

Lions has the Lions Project for Canine Companions for Independence or LPCCI. Contributions are made to LPCCI, through life membership, club memberships, awards, sponsorships, fundraising, puppy raising, and volunteering. Their goal is to soon have representation and support in all 50 states.

One area these dogs are trained is to become a Diabetic Alert Dog. These dogs are trained to alert the diabetic handler of low (hypoglycemia) or high (hyperglycemia) events. The dog monitor smells in the air for a specific scent on the human breath or in their sweat, which relates to the blood sugar change. The scent is caused by the release of a compound called isoprene, and the dog can respond to this up to 30 minutes before the person has any symptoms.



I would like you to meet Daisy. She is an 8 year-old chocolate lab, who has been working as a Diabetic Alert Dog since she was 2 years old. Daisy, as each dog, has certain ways of alerting

her handler. If blood sugar is high, she puts her nose to the handler's face near the mouth area. If the sugar level is low, she hits the handler's leg with her right paw. She finished her training at Monroe K-9 Academy in Charlestown NH. Daisy has been an amazing girl. She has alerted her handler many, many times of sugar level changes and has truly saved her handler's life a number of times. Miss Daisy enjoys her free time to play, but knows when the vest goes on, play time is over and she's at work.

One example of how special she is; these dogs are a one person dog, but Daisy wanted to share the love. She was brought up spending a lot of time at a family members home. One night when she was staying with this family member, she would not leave him alone. She kept pawing at him with her right foot and finally he realized what she was doing and took his blood sugar. He was extremely low. She very possibly saved his life that night.

Please remember, NEVER approach a Service Dog unless asking the handler first. Respect the work that all Service animals do. There is much more information about Diabetic Alert Dogs and all other Service Dogs online.

Thank you for letting me share about these working animals and the important jobs they have.

Just one more note on Daisy, she is actually my Diabetic Alert Dog, a hard worker, with a great personality.

Until next month, enjoy the beautiful foliage and remember, these dogs follow the Lions Motto "We Serve".

The Board is looking for ideas for a fundraiser or two to help meet our mission of assisting local clubs meet the need for sight and hearing projects for members of their communities.
