Many of us are confusing what a Service Project is and what is a Fundraiser. The following excerpts were taken from the Lions Club International Service Tool Kit. It helps explain why it is important to accurately document our service projects and our fundraisers so everyone can see the impact we are making on our communities. Some Service Projects can also be fundraisers but they are not always both.

"Sharing your impact is important to members, to clubs and to our organization as a whole. It helps us chart our progress as an organization, tell our story to prospective partners and much more. From simple community service projects to large, comprehensive screening projects, reporting will shine a light on how — and where — local clubs are making a difference in their communities and in the world." (Lions Club International Service Tool Kit)

What is a reportable service activity? There are two types of reportable service activity: direct and indirect. *Direct Service*—Lions and Leos plan and implement a service project to serve community needs and interact directly with the people being served.

Examples: A community event providing diabetes education and screening services, an ongoing support group for those affected by childhood cancer, an educational activity where children receive a healthy breakfast, a community event providing Be The Match screening, Kids Sight Screenings.

Indirect Service — When Lions serve but do not interact directly with beneficiaries.

Examples: A fundraising event where funds/resources are donated to another organization, a community improvement project (e.g., facility improvement, tree planting), the collection/donation of canned food to a local food pantry, environment-related service projects are often longer term than other types of projects.

Examples: A club cleaned, beautified or improved a park, and reports 1 community space cared for, a club plants 5 trees, and reports 5 trees planted, a club cares for 15 young trees or saplings through watering, weeding and mulching, and reports 15 trees cared for, a Leo club cared for 150 trees and educated 50 community members about their project and the environment. The club reports 50 people served.

Fundraising events raise funds that are then used for other charitable giving such as scholarships, donations to local agencies help people in such areas as: Diabetes, Mental Health, Childhood diseases, Caring for the Homeless or aging population.

Starting at home, before you just crank up the heat, how about just putting on another layer of clothing? Crafty people often have more yarn or fabric than they might ever be able to use and I can publish it in my article. would happily donate some of their stash for a great project. Polar fleece is a wonderfully forgiving fabric that can be used to make blankets with no sewing required!

There are lots of ways to recycle your way through autumn with a little imagination.

At the recent 44N Cabinet Meeting in Peterborough we had a presentation by Jackie McLoon of the Rhode Island Blood Center. Jackie gave a heartfelt talk on pediatric cancer, and how we can help.

I thought I would explain the two ways of donating to this life saving procedure.

-PBSC (peripheral blood stem cell). Non-surgical called apheresis. Donor receives a drug for 5 days prior, to increase number of cells in bloodstream. Cells are collected during donation.

-Marrow donation. Surgical, outpatient, takes place in hospital. Patient is anesthetized. Marrow is collected at back of pelvic bone.

Remember: This is lifesaving. There is no price that can be put on saving a child's life! And, donation occurs ONLY if you are found to be a match after joining through a cheek swab.

Tune in next month to hear more of the DG Challenge being held this year.

I would like you to meet Rick Ellis. He is a Conference Service

Technician at Dartmouth-Hitchcock,

but today I found him at the Hanover Farmers Market making Kettle Korn; hence the face shield.

Rick is one of the less than 5% of diabetics who are diagnosed with Type 2 diabetes then in later adulthood are re-diagnosed, or changed to Type 1. That's exactly what happened to Rick in October of 2018, after being a Type 2 diabetic for 12 years, Rick's world quickly changed. He and his endocrinology team went to work on a plan for Rick to better control his disease. The solution was "THE PUMP"!! There are several types of pumps, but for Rick's needs, the Tandem pump with a Dexco G6 sensor was decided on. There is a small insertion site which is good for 10 days, then the site needs to be changed.

The transmitter is good for 90 days and the syringe on the pump is good for 3 days. The transmitter reads out on the pump a real time glucose test number every 5 minutes. The pump has been programmed, so when Rick enters the test number on the pump, it automatically knows the amount of insulin to give. Rick takes Humalog insulin through his pump. Rick says, the pump has made life so much easier for him. No finger sticks, no test strips, no daily multiple needle injections. He can go to the lake with the grandkids and not worry about his sugar levels.

Rick also wanted to thank Dr. Joanne Conroy CEO/President of D-H, for the diabetes initiative that was started January of this year.

Dartmouth employees with Please let me know when you do, so diabetes, pay nothing for their supplies, when they use the Dartmouth Pharmacy.

> Please realize the pump is not for everyone, but for those who plan with their endo team, the pump is the way to go, it can be a life changer.

OPIOD AWARENESS - New Hampshire

When DG Sue asked me to consider writing about opioid awareness for the ROAR, I agreed to do so seeing an opportunity to learn and at the same time share that knowledge with other Lions. Since I love learning, it was easy to say yes. Once I began researching the topic, I realized how complicated it is and how great of an impact it has on people here in New Hampshire.

So what I'd like to do is break it down into several pieces so as to make it easier to digest (and less of a lengthy dissertation!). I will address several pieces each month. The following are the questions I'll attempt to answer:

- 1) What is the opioid crisis (or epidemic)?
- 2) What are opioids and how prevalent are their use?
 - 3) What are the causes of the crisis?
 - 4) Who is affected by the crisis (i.e. demographics)?
- 5) What legal measures have been taken to address the crisis?
 - 6) What treatment is available?
- 7) And lastly, how can we as Lions help out in our communities?

Let's start with what is the crisis. The opioid crisis refers to the rapid increase in drug overdoses due to the use of prescription (legal) and non-prescription (illegal) opioid drugs in the USA that has occurred since the late 1990's. Overdose deaths involving opioids have increased from 8,048 in 1999 (or 22 per day) to 47,600 in 2017 (or 130 per day). That is a 591% increase over just 18 years! And the scary part is that this increase has accelerated over the past 4 years going from 24,000 to 47,600 per year. This is why drug overdoses have become the leading cause of death for Americans under the age of 50.

So what are these drugs that lead to all these overdoses? Opioids are a diverse class of painkillers. They include the illegal drug heroin, synthetic opioids such as fentanyl, and legal pain relievers prescribed by doctors such as oxycodone (e.g., OxyContin and Percocet), hydrocodone (e.g., Vicodin and Norco), codeine and morphine. These substances are highly addictive and as such are prone to overdose. They also vary in strength with the legal

ones being of moderate strength and the illegal ones (heroin and fentanyl) being very strong. And the stronger the substance, the greater likelihood that an overdose will occur.

And how prevalent is their use? In the late 1990's there were around 100 million people in the USA affected by chronic pain. That is about 1/3 of the USA population! Between 1991 and 2016, prescriptions for painkillers almost quadrupled from 76 million to 289 million. To put this level of painkillers prescribed in the USA into perspective, the rate in the USA was 40% higher than developed countries like Canada and Germany in 2017.

I'll end here and pick up again next month with a discussion of the causes of the crisis and who is affected by it.





Meeting. Virginia said that it was a good feeling for them and excitement for Frances and the club.





DG Sue Lindberg called to order her first District 44N Social Meeting. After all introductions to all new district officers and the GAT team were made, she welcomed guest speaker, Jackie McLoon of the RI Blood Center to speak about the "Be the Match" program which DG Sue followed up with a "DG Be the Match Challenge".

DG Be the Match Challenge Rules:

- 1. Each District Governor who wants to play must put in \$100 of their personal money.
- 2. Every District that plays will receive their own District promo code from "Be the Match".
- 3. At every Bone Marrow swab event or from people sending theirs in, they need to use the promo code for the District they want to give credit to.
- 4. During the year, "Be the Match" will be able to tell us every District's total based on the use of the promo code.
- 5. We will do updates at NELC meetings during the year, (October, January, and the grand finale in May).

- 7. It is the District Governor's responsibility to promote this contest, promote their District's individual promo code and work to get the most swabs.

NOTE: Swabs are generally done with people ages 18-44. Those up to 60 can pay about \$100 to have swabs processed.

Many Lions are not eligible so we need to hold public events.


